SCOTTISH ROOTS

Between 1770 and 1815, around 15,000 Scots—mainly from the Highlands and Islands—emigrated to Canada, beginning new lives in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Quebec. Gaelic soon became Canada's third most common European language. Nova Scotia's flag, a blend of Scotland's Lion Rampant and Saltire, reflects this heritage. The Scots who settled in Nova Scotia established fishing, farming, and shipbuilding traditions that thrive to this day, along with Gaelic language and music, especially in Nova Scotia and Cape Breton.

Cape Breton Facts + Stats

ENGULFED

Wondering what body of water you are gazing at from your room or the fairway? Inverness sits along the Gulf of Saint Lawrence, a part of the Atlantic Ocean with warmer, calmer waters, thanks to being surrounded on three sides by land. This is especially true on the island's west side, home to Cabot Links.

CAPE BRETON CONNECTION

Cape Breton Island is connected to the mainland of Nova Scotia by a man-made causeway. Prior to the causeway's completion, the only access to the island was by boat, ferry or train. A causeway was built rather than a bridge as it is more structurally sound and able to withstand the extreme pressure of shifting ice and high winds during winter months. After 10 million tons of rock, Cape Breton was permanently connected to the Mainland on Friday December 10, 1954. An official opening took place several months later on August 13, 1955.

Head out for a **morning round at Cabot Links**. Every swing brings you closer to the raw beauty of Cape Breton, with the ocean breeze shaping your shots as you play along the coast.

Recharge with **lunch at Cabot Bar** before heading out on your scenic afternoon **side-by-side tour**.

As evening falls, savour a gourmet **dinner at Panorama**, and cap the night with a cozy round of drinks at **Whit's Public House**, where live music and warm company complete a perfect day.

SECOND FULL DAY

Start your morning with a peaceful **fly-fishing experience on the Margaree River**, casting your line in famed salmon waters, surrounded by Cape Breton's rugged beauty.

Stop at the **Dancing Goat for a late breakfast or early lunch**. This cozy café, a local favorite, serves freshly baked pastries and hearty dishes, offering a taste of Cape Breton's warmth.

Spend the **afternoon playing Cabot Cliffs**, where every hole feels like stepping into a postcard.

As the day winds down, savour **dinner at Coore's Lobster Shack**. The scent of fresh lobster and ocean air create the perfect setting for a classic Maritime meal, capping off a day filled with Cape Breton's natural beauty and charm.

CABOT LINKS

EXPERIENCE CANADA'S FIRST AUTHENTIC LINKS

Cabot Links is where the heart of traditional links golf meets the raw beauty of Cape Breton. Artfully designed by Canadian architect Rod Whitman, every hole at this 6,860-yard layout, offers an ocean view. Its routing meanders from the quaint village of Inverness to the rugged coast of the Atlantic Ocean, and five holes of this World Top 100 course play directly along the beautiful beach. Walking these fairways, you'll feel the game as it was meant to be played—on firm, fast ground with the wind shaping every shot. This is golf that challenges and inspires, bringing you closer to nature, the sea, and the heart of the game.

GOLF ON THE EDGE OF THE WORLD

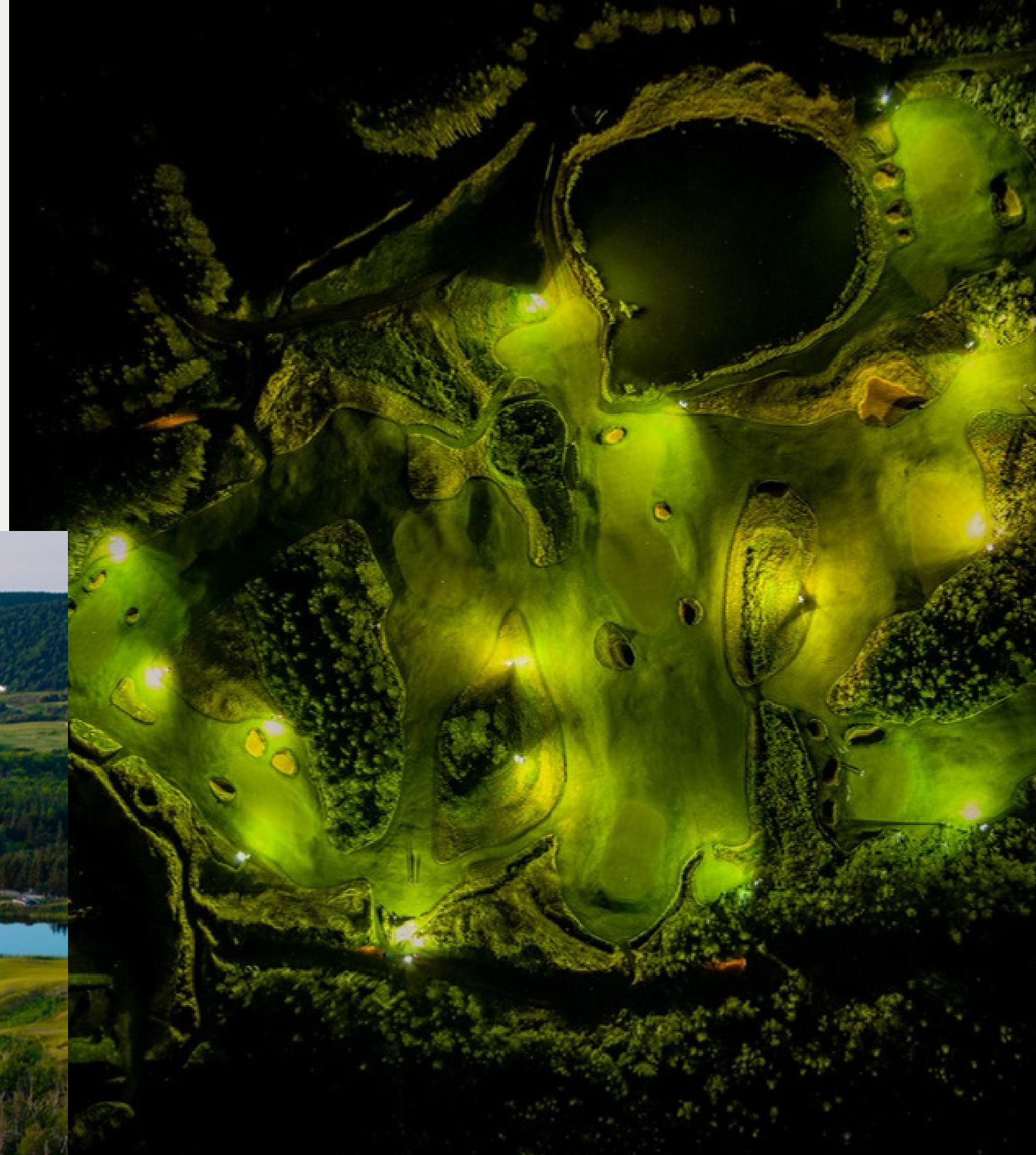

With a number of hiking and walking trails ranging from treks alongside rugged coastlines and sandy beaches, to trails featuring waterfalls and mountaintop vistas, there are plenty of options for all skill levels.



HIKING AND WALKING

INVERNESS BOARDWALK

 10 MIN  30 MIN  EASY

Beginning just off Inverness’s Central Avenue and continuing along the Inverness Beach and Cabot Links, the Inverness Boardwalk offers miles of panoramic views. Amidst the coastal scenery and refreshing ocean breeze, it’s the ideal spot for a relaxing stroll or jog.

UISGE BAN (ISH-KA-BAN) FALLS

 1 HOUR  1-2 HOURS  EASY

Uisge Ban Falls, meaning “white water” in Gaelic, features a 4 km trail through maple, birch, and beech forests, leading to a stunning 16-meter (50-foot) waterfall. The Falls Trail, about 3 km long, takes roughly an hour to complete. The park also offers picnic facilities, making it a perfect spot for a scenic day out.

SKYLINE TRAIL

 1.5 HOURS  1-2 HOURS  EASY

This 7 km loop on the western side of Cabot Trail offers breathtaking views of the rugged coast. From its dramatic headland, take in an eagle’s-eye view of the Cabot Trail winding down to the sea. Along the way, spot whales in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, moose, bald eagles, and boreal birds.



LOCAL TRAILS

 ON SITE  30 MIN  EASY

When you’re ready to stretch your legs beyond the fairways, Cabot Cape Breton’s walking trails are the perfect way to immerse yourself in the natural beauty of the coastline. Spanning approximately 5 km, these scenic loops wind through lush forests, along tranquil orchards, and past serene open spaces. Whether you opt for the gentle **Orchard Loop**, the meandering **Fairway Trail**, or the more adventurous **Forest Loop**, each path offers a unique perspective on the landscape. Let these trails, which begin near the tennis courts and Coore’s Lobster Shack, guide you to moments of quiet discovery.

EGYPT FALLS

 25 MIN  45 MIN  DIFFICULT

Egypt Falls, also known as Piper’s Glen, offers a short 15-minute hike through hardwoods leading to a stunning waterfall. The final stretch requires climbing the gorge’s steep walls, with ropes for support. It’s a perfect spot to swim, relax, and enjoy a picnic surrounded by nature, making it an ideal retreat for outdoor lovers.

CABOT TRAIL

Among Cape Breton's greatest treasures lies the world-renowned Cabot Trail. Winding its way along the northern tip of the island and showcasing some of the most spectacular scenery in all of Canada, this 298-km-long trail is a bucket list experience for many. Whether you have time for the entire trail, or just a half day trip, you're sure to enjoy the beautiful scenery, culture and history along the way.

BADDECK

Baddeck is a charming village nestled in the heart of Cape Breton. It's the perfect spot for relaxing and exploring! Visit the Alexander Graham Bell Museum to learn about the famous inventor's connection to the town, stroll along the scenic waterfront, or set sail on a boat tour of the lake. Nature lovers will enjoy nearby hiking trails like the Uisge Ban Falls, while the local shops and restaurants offer cozy spots to savour local flavours.

CHÉTICAMP

Thriving with Acadian culture, this quaint fishing village is located just on the cusp of the Cape Breton Highlands National Park. Acadian food, traditional rug hooking, whale watching, and a variety of outdoor activities should be on your Cheticamp agenda. Wind down on the boardwalk overlooking the harbor and watch the sun go down while listening to live Acadian music.

INGONISH

Home to rugged headlands, sandy beaches, lush green valleys and wild, open barrens, Ingonish is the gateway to the Cape Breton Highlands National Park. Golfers will enjoy playing the 18-hole Highlands Links, a former World Top 100 Course and the best course in Canada in 2000 by Score Golf magazine.

Planning to kick back and relax for a day at the beach? We are happy to arrange transportation, beach activities or whip up a great picnic of your choice! Not only does Inverness showcase an enormous sandy beach, but also the **warmest waters north of the Carolinas!** While it's a tad chilly in the spring and fall, the water levels out to around 20 degrees Celsius (68°F) in July and August. In addition to being warm, expansive and close, Inverness Beach also boasts lifeguards so you can enjoy your time at the beach knowing that you're swimming at one of the few lifeguarded beaches in the province of Nova Scotia. The fully trained lifeguards are on duty from 10AM to 6PM seven days a week.

FLY FISHING THE MARGAREE

 25 MIN  HALF/FULL DAY  4 PEOPLE MAX

The Margaree River is home to several species of fish. While the Atlantic Salmon make the river world famous, speckled trout, brown trout and Striped Bass are found in abundance. Fall is a spectacular time of year on the Margaree, with the surrounding mountains offering beautiful colour and Atlantic Salmon that range from 12 to 40lbs. If you're interesting in embarking on a world class Fly-Fishing experience on Cape Breton Island's Margaree River, we will connect you with our in-house guide who can give you instruction on the basics or, for the advanced sportsmen, tips on the best pools and local flies.
